LETTER FROM THE DIRECTOR

Your Justice Academy has been extremely busy over the past year. The circumstances surrounding the COVID-19 pandemic presented numerous challenges for us, specifically in the delivery of in-person training courses – But In every challenge, there is opportunity. Opportunity to reassess, refocus, and renew.

Academy staff seized the opportunity and doubled down on virtual class offerings to meet the needs of the field during the Covid-19 Pandemic. In addition, we reassessed our strategy moving forward, especially in light of recommendations made by our various stakeholders' groups. We began an in-depth look at the courses most requested by our partner agencies, and how we could revise our training to incorporate recommendations from the NC Sheriffs' Association and NC Association of Chiefs of Police. Further, the end of FY 2021 saw the Academy enter the final stages of curriculum development for the Basic Law Enforcement Training Revision Project. We are excited to begin piloting this new curriculum in 2022. In addition, job task analyses were completed for Detention Officer and Telecommunicator classifications, with innovative curriculum revisions in development. Finally, in response to the needs of the field, your Academy began training officers in the I.C.A.T. (Integrating Communication, Assessment, and Tactics) program. This industry-leading de-escalation training program was developed by the Police Executive Research Foundation and has received high praise by a number of NC law enforcement agencies.

Your Academy reinvested in strong partnerships as an integral step in refocusing our efforts as an agency. Via the aforementioned BLET Revision Project we collaborated with numerous stakeholder groups, to include the Human Trafficking Commission and NC Victim Assistance Network, in addition to the NC Chiefs and NC Sheriffs' Associations. Finally, we are working with both the Criminal Justice and Sheriffs' Standards Divisions on implementing the Acadis® platform to manage their certification tracking and compliance needs. Having one platform serving all three of our divisions will create a more seamless and efficient user experience for every officer in North Carolina.

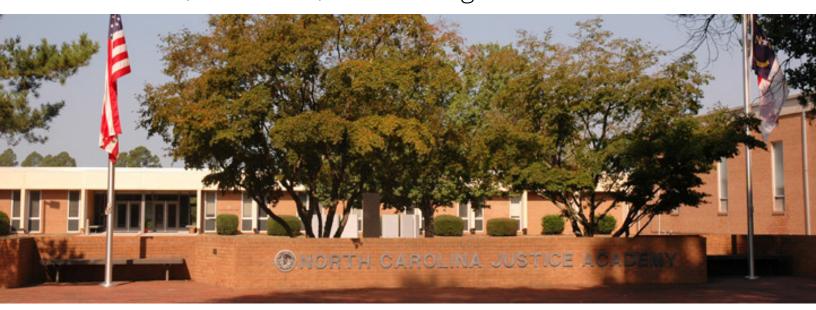
Lastly, The Academy took the opportunity to renew our facilities. Residence halls have been completely renovated and refurnished. The Salemburg cafeteria and support services building were rejuvenated with new carpet, paint, and furniture. In Edneyville, a new Telecommunications Simulator was installed to support certification training. In addition, numerous other projects have been identified such as repaving of our driving track, and the construction of a scenario-based training facility to support a multitude of practical skills training components. These projects require funding and our stakeholder groups have leant their official endorsements for us to receive legislative funding to make these items a reality.

Despite the many challenges faced over the past year, your Justice Academy team worked diligently to continue service to our stakeholders at the highest levels. We look forward to seeing you in Edneyville and Salemburg very soon.

with their duties, NCJA staff present at regional
and international conferences throughout the
fiscal year while developing courses to address
immediate issues and needs facing criminal





Some of these relevant and innovative trainings include In-Service, NCJA Leadership Institute, Integrating Communications, Assessment, and Tactics (ICAT), Employee Development and Performance Management, Field Training Officer, First Line Supervision, Forensic Analysis of Shooting Incidents, Crime Scene Investigation, Basic Patrol Rifle Operator, School Resource Officer, Community Oriented Policing, and Taking Race Relations and Understanding to Heart.

We are also thankful for our partnerships and advisory groups that help us administer updates to BLET, Instructor Training, Telecommunicator, Detention Officer, Firearms, Driving, SCAT, PT, and Speed Measuring Instrument Training programs. The ongoing development of our new BLET program pursuant to the recent BLET Task Analysis is going very well, and once complete promises to be the best BLET program in the nation, providing excellent basic training to new law enforcement officers across the state. Additionally, we are very excited to be progressing with revisions to our Telecommunicator Certification Course and Detention Officer Certification Course pursuant to a recent Job Task Analysis for each discipline.

SUPPORT SERVICES

- Annual Outside Agency Meeting conducted to provide our partners with needed information.
- The Justice Academy was still able to support the State Employees Combines Campaign even during COVID-19 by selling masks with our logo to our staff members and Department of Justice staff members. Also, we sold flags to memorialize people for Memorial Day.
- Genuine Foods, a new Dining Hall vendor, will provide food services to the campus.
- NCJA received its fifth accreditation award from the Commission of Accreditation for Law Enforcement (CALEA) on March 26, 2021.

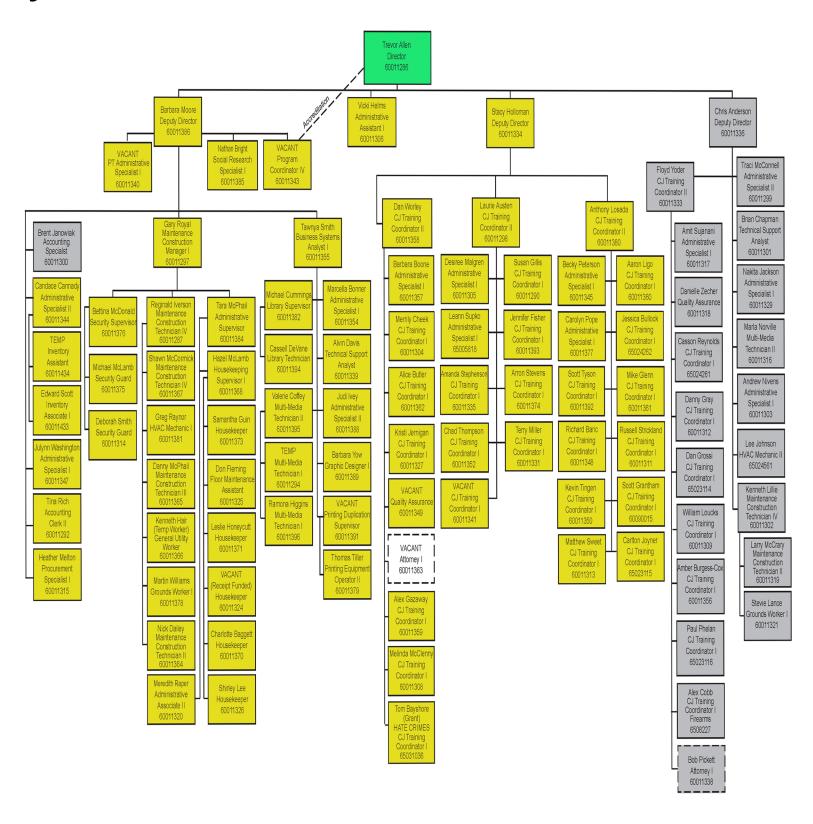
