North Carolina Department of Justice Hurricane Helene FAQ *Current as of December 16, 2024*

I have questions about food, shelter, roadways, or need other general non-emergency information. Who can I call?

- Call 211 for any non-emergency related questions.

What are the road conditions?

- You can see the current roadway conditions by visiting DriveNC.gov or calling 511.
- DOT has ended the Western North Carolina “Do Not Travel” advisory.
 - o You can use their [dashboard](#) to track progress on temporary repairs and reconstruction of roadways.

I need shelter. Where can I find out what to do?

I need help with clean-up at my home. Are there resources that can help me?

- FEMA is accepting applications for the Individual Assistance Program, which includes money for emergency housing at hotels, immediate recovery needs and more. Call 800-621-3362 or visit DisasterAssistance.gov for more information or to get started on an application.
 - o The deadline to file for FEMA Individual Assistance has been extended to Jan. 7, 2025.
 - o FEMA’s helpline is available from 7 a.m. to 11 p.m. daily. The line is open daily, and help is available in multiple languages.
- You should take photos of the damage and document what occurred and what your losses are. Then begin the clean-up process when it is safe to do so. And beware of scammers!
 - o Do not pay for work up front. Use a check or a credit card if possible.
 - o Beware of any contractor who tries to rush you or who comes to your home offering assistance.
 - o Report suspected scammers to local police and DOJ.

My home or community has damage. What is next?

- Damage assessments are being scheduled with impacted communities and counties where damage to homes, structures, and public infrastructure.
- The US Small Business Administration has **paused** offering loans for disaster assistance for homeowners, renters, nonprofits, and businesses until Congress approves more funding. While applications are still open and being processed, applicants will not have their funds disbursed until Congress provides the money. - To ease burdens for people whose vehicles were damaged by Hurricane Helene, the DMV will [suspend](#) the collection of various application and late fees, suspend certain requirements for both residents and businesses, and extend certain licenses for mechanics and businesses.
- Impacted persons who have relocated due to the storm can submit a change of address request at [Official USPS® Change-of-Address Form](#).

My home or business had damage and I have questions. Who can I email?

I am a farmer whose agriculture and livestock were harmed. Who can I contact?

- The N.C. Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services has activated its hotline to connect farmers with resources that can assist with damage and other agricultural emergencies related to the storm. The toll-free number is 1-866-645-9403. A live operator will be available on the hotline weekdays between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m.

My job has been affected by the storm? Are there resources that can help me?

- The deadline to apply for Disaster Unemployment Assistance (DUA) has been extended to Jan. 7, 2025. To learn more and to apply, visit: [Disaster Unemployment Assistance | DES](#)
 - o If you need help applying, call the dedicated DUA Hotline at 919-629-3857 between 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.
- Governor Roy Cooper issued an emergency [Executive Order](#) authorizing the Division of Employment Security to increase the amount of weekly unemployment payments available to North Carolinians in the aftermath of Hurricane Helene.
 - o Weekly unemployment benefits will increase from a maximum of \$350 a week to a maximum of \$600 a week. The order will also increase benefits by \$250 a week (up to the \$600 cap) for all eligible workers. This order is tied to the State of Emergency for Hurricane Helene.
- People in Western North Carolina counties impacted by Hurricane Helene who are enrolled in Food and Nutrition Services now have access to replacement benefits on their Electronic Benefit Transfer (EBT) cards. The United States Department of Agriculture approved North Carolina to allow current FNS participants in [23 counties](#) to receive 70 percent of their total monthly September benefit back on their EBT card. The benefit replacement is automatic and does not require action from the FNS participant.
- Families looking for child care can find assistance through the NC Child Care Hotline at 1-888-600-1685 from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. on weekdays. It is run through DHHS and the Child Care Resource & Referral agencies to help families find child care options for children up to 12 years old.
- Land of Sky Regional Council created a [map](#) of public Wi-Fi resources to help individuals who do not have working internet.

Questions about support for emotional distress related to the disaster?

- Call or text 1-800-985-5990. This is a national hotline providing year-round disaster crisis counseling. This toll-free, multilingual, crisis support service is available 24/7.
- DHHS has launched the Hope4NC Helpline (1-855-587-3463) to provide free, 24/7 mental health support for first responders and volunteers working on our Hurricane Helene disaster response. It is help for the helpers.
- The Disability Disaster Hotline, 800-626-4959, provides information, referrals and guidance to people with disabilities and their families during disasters. Help is available 24/7.
- Governor Cooper issued an [executive order](#) providing bereavement leave for state employees.

- Employees will be eligible for up to 40 hours of paid leave following the loss of an immediate family member, including a spouse, child, sibling, parent, or grandparent. Step, half, and in-law family members are included along with any dependent living in the employee's home.
- The bereavement leave covers the loss of a loved one for any reason and is retroactive to September 27, 2024, due to Hurricane Helene. Any eligible employee who suffered a loss after September 27, whether due to the storm or other causes, will have access to the leave. Eligible employees have up to six months after the death to take leave.
- Employees who lost a colleague will be eligible for up to eight hours of bereavement leave to attend a funeral or memorial service for their coworker.

I have a loved one who is incarcerated and am worried for their safety.

- The North Carolina Department of Adult Corrections (DAC) has confirmed that all incarcerated populations are safe.
 - DAC has a Family and Friends Hotline for questions from loved ones of incarcerated persons 1-800-368-1985.
 - Visiting at all occupied prison facilities has returned to normal schedules and operations.
- Two facilities, Avery-Mitchell Correctional Institution and Mountain View Correctional Institution, remain vacant until drinking water is restored.
 - Offenders returned to Craggy Correctional Center, Western Correctional Center for Women, and the Black Mountain Substance Abuse Treatment Center for Women during the week of November 18, after the water system that serves Asheville and much of Buncombe County began providing drinkable water.
 - Offenders may not return to the same facilities where they were housed pre-storm. Craggy Correctional Institution was repopulated by men in medium custody. It housed a minimum-custody population before the storm. An additional unit at Alexander Correctional Institution has been re-opened and occupied by men in medium custody.
- Locations of incarcerated persons appear on the [NCDAC Offender Public Information database](#) approximately 24 hours after relocation.

I have questions about water safety and contamination.

Questions about health insurance appeals, network services, prescription drugs and other medical treatment.

Questions about misinformation.

- North Carolina Emergency Management (NCME) and local officials are cautioning the public about false Helene reports and misinformation being shared on social media. Questions about taxes for those affected by Helene.

Applications for assistance are due on December 26, 2024.
 - Legionnaires and Sons of the American Legion members may be eligible for up to \$3,000.
 - Legion Posts may be eligible for up to \$10,000.

Questions about legislative relief.

- Governor Cooper signed the [Disaster Recovery Act of 2024](#) on October 10, 2024.
- This law creates a new Hurricane Helene fund with \$273 million from the state's Savings Reserve Fund. Here's how it breaks down:
 - \$250 million to the Department of Public Safety's Division of Emergency Management to match to federal disaster relief funds.

- A portion of these funds establishes a revolving loan program to help local governments and state agencies with cash flow while they are waiting for federal reimbursement.
- \$16 million to the Department of Public Instruction for lost compensation of school nutrition employees due to school closures.
- \$2 million to provide local governments technical assistance with local recovery funds.
- \$5 million to the State Board of Elections.
- The law also:
 - Allows public schools to make up or mark as completed any number of the days or hours missed and use up to 30 days of remote instruction toward required instructional days.
 - Waives DMV fees for obtaining a duplicate driver's license.
 - Waives certain environmental requirements for state highway repairs.
 - Grants county board of elections flexibility to address polling site issues.
- Attorney General Josh Stein said [this](#) about the legislation:
 - "I thank the General Assembly for moving quickly to draft and pass this bill and allocate initial funds for western North Carolina relief and recovery. As I've traveled western North Carolina and visited with affected people, it has been abundantly clear that the work to help our fellow North Carolinians is going to take weeks, months – and in some cases, even years. We're going to need to keep working together on a bipartisan basis to help our neighbors recover from this disaster."
- Governor Cooper signed the [Disaster Recovery Act of 2024 – Part II](#) on October 25, 2024.
- The law adds \$604 million to the Helene fund, including:
 - \$65 million for the Department of Public Instruction
 - \$20 million for the University of North Carolina
 - \$71.4 million for DHHS
 - \$56 million to the Department of Commerce
 - \$139 million to the Department of Environmental Quality
 - \$130 million to the DPS
 - \$106 to the Office of State Budget and Management and the Treasurer
 - \$16.7 million for community colleges.
- The relief package also grants additional calendar flexibility to impacted public school districts, up to 20 additional waived days, and provides emergency grants for postsecondary students who have suffered financial hardship due to Hurricane Helene.
